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### Other Programs

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#### Double Majors

Students earn *double majors* by completing all of the major requirements in any two departments.

#### Individual Interdisciplinary Major

Students may propose an individual interdisciplinary major should that student discover a well-defined intellectual interest that crosses one or more of the boundaries of the established fields of concentration. An interdisciplinary major involves a detailed program of study with courses drawn from at least two departments, but only one senior thesis and/or comprehensive examination.

#### Liberal Arts-Engineering Dual Degree Program

Students study liberal arts at Bates College for three years, and then enroll in a two-year engineering program at Columbia University, Dartmouth College, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Case Western Reserve University, or Washington University in St. Louis. Upon completion of this five-year program, students receive an undergraduate degree from Bates and a bachelor of science degree in engineering from the engineering-school affiliate.
