Double Majors

Students earn *double majors* by completing all of the major requirements in any two departments.

Liberal Arts-Engineering Dual Degree Plan (3/2 Engineering Program)

Students study liberal arts at Bates College for three years, and then enroll in a two-year engineering program at Columbia University, Dartmouth College, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Case Western Reserve University, or Washington University in St. Louis for two years. Upon completion, students receive an undergraduate degree from Bates and a bachelor of science degree in engineering from the engineering-school affiliate.
