NEAIR Research Grants Program

The Research Grants Program supports professional development opportunities for NEAIR members either through 1) attendance and participation at international IR meetings or domestic professional meetings of related non-IR disciplines; or 2) collaborative research with colleagues from other countries, or research in this country on important IR issues that are under-represented in meeting programs, literature, or because of institutional resource constraints.

The grants, which range from a maximum of \$800 for an individual conference grant to \$1000 for an individual research grant, are awarded based on their merit and value to NEAIR and to the profession. Grant recipients are required to report on their findings to NEAIR members. Please note that ALL ACTIVE NEAIR members are eligible for this program. All applicants must submit a proposal by the deadlines (March 1 and September 1) to:

BEST PAPER AWARD FOR THE NEAIR-98 CONFERENCE

Using Predictive Modeling to Target Student Recruitment: Theory and Practice

Presenters: **Emily Thomas**, Director of Planning and Institutional Research, State University of New York at Stony Brook; **Gayle Reznik**, Research Assistant, Office of Institutional Research, State University of New York at Stony Brook; and **William Dawes**, Undergraduate Director, Department of Economics, State University of New York at Stony Brook;

In the competitive market of student recruitment, college admissions offices are experimenting with the use of predictive models to increase the effectiveness of their recruitment efforts. Regression analysis is used to estimate students' probability of enrollment. Then different recruitment activities are directed at students with different enrollment probabilities. This paper argues that a typical use of predictive modeling is theoretically unsound and may therefore be operationally inefficient. To test this hypothesis and explore an alternative use of predictive modeling we designed and assessed an experimental recruitment program. The first-year results confirm our perspective and identify a valuable role for statistical modeling in recruitment management.

Update on an NEAIR Research
Grants Project:
Study of Institutional Researchers'
Leadership Role

We are now in the data collection phase of this study investigating institutional researchers' leadership role. Thank you to so many who have completed and returned their surveys. The first mailing to more than 300 members of NEAIR yielded a response rate of 59 percent. Through our follow-up efforts, we hope to achieve an even higher rate. During the coming spring semester, I plan to begin the analysis. Once this phase is completed, I will prepare a proposal to present the results at next fall's NEAIR Conference.

In addition to focusing on leadership, the study addresses issues involving career related challenges, professional development, and resources and strategies for achieving professional success. Through this research, we hope to generate ideas for the design of future professional development programs for institutional researchers and to identify critical areas of research that others might pursue

through the NEAIR Research Grants Program. Thanks again to all who have supported and participated in this research.

Note on the 20th Annual Forum of the European Association for Institutional Research

With generous support from Babson College, I attended the 20th Annual Forum of the European Association for Institutional Research. The forum was held from September 9th through the 12th in San Sebastian, in the Basque country at the north of Spain. San Sebastian is a beautiful city located on the coast and surrounded by mountains. The setting was very beautiful and uplifting. The forum was held at the Miramar Palace, the former summer residence of the royal family.

The theme of this year's forum was Higher Education Institutions: Open to Innovation, Willing to Learn. Compared with our institutional research conferences in the United States, the forum attendees seemed to include more administrators and policy makers. One of the most rewarding aspects of the forum was the opportunity it provided to meet people from many parts of the world, including Australia, New Zealand, South America, South Africa, as well as many European countries.

Forum presentations included policy studies, scholarly research and applied institutional research studies. Dr. Trudy Banta, from the United States, was one of the keynote speakers. Other representatives from the United States included Lydia Snover, from MIT, and Susan Frost, from Emory University, who presented a paper entitled, <u>Using Faculty Feedback to Improve Teaching: Lessons from Two Private Research Universities in the United States.</u> The title of my presentation was <u>Designing Graduate Admission Studies for</u> Strategic Decision-Making.

Fortunately, the official language of the forum was in English. Some presentations were offered in Spanish with simultaneous translation in English. The experience was very enriching professionally and personally. Following the forum, I enjoyed a short trip to Madrid. I would highly recommend this forum to other members of our Northeast Association for Institutional Research.
